


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### COMMUNITY HEALTH IMPROVEMENT PLAN PRIORITIES



The LifeSmiles Dental Health Program's collaborate objective is to community-based groups, healthcare providers, and organizations to provide preventive dental services and improve care. access to dental TRPHD collaborates with local schools to provide dental care to children through visits to schools twice each school year. This past year we partnered with 27 head starts, preschools, and schools. This was an additional 9 locations than done the previous year.




Two Rivers partnered with Lexington Public School and helped transport 54 children to UNMC Dental College in Lincoln to assist in gaining dental treatment. Each child was seen and provided treatment free of charge. These children previously did not have a dental home or insurance to cover treatments needed.

## COVID-19 Response

Men and women adopt public health initiatives at different rates, and this must inform public health policy and communication initiatives

TRPHD, Private hospitals and clinics within the county were mostly responsible for first and second doses of vaccine.

Residents mostly accessed COVID vaccine booster doses from walk-in pharmacies across the district.

Two Rivers Public Health Department was the only entity with a significant contribution to vaccine provision across all 7 counties.

Although a small proportion of residents in smaller counties (Franklin, Gosper, Harlan) crossed county lines to access vaccinations in larger counties (Buffalo or Dawson counties), the reverse phenomenon (residents of Buffalo and Dawson traveling to Kearney, Franklin, Gosper, Harlan, Franklin for vaccines)

Counties are arranged in order of increasing population from left to right. Age categories are grouped in order of increasing age from top to bottom.

Vaccination rates are higher in larger compared to smaller counties. Rates are also higher among older residents when compared to younger adults

Women have consistently higher rates of vaccination compared to men. This difference is seen across all counties and for all ages above 10 years.

# ELIGIBLE VFC IMMUNIZATIONS ADMINISTERED


The Vaccines For Children (VFC) program is a federally funded program that provides vaccines at no cost to children who might not otherwise be vaccinated because of inability to pay. The CDC buys vaccine at a discounted rate for distribution to registered VFC providers. Children who are eligible\* for VFC vaccines are entitled to receive those vaccines recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP). TRPHD helps provide these at mobile clinics and at our office.

TRPHD took over disease investigations for STIs in September of 2022. In 2023, TRPHD nurses investigated the following totals:

Chlamydia: 352 Gonorrhea: 22 Syphilis: 34

HIV: 6

TRPHD nurses offer education, resources, and most importantly, Partner Services. This is a service to help clients notify partners discretely and anonymously.

At the end of 2022, TRPHD hired McKenzie the division's Petersen as Specialist. **Environmental** Health McKenzie monitors and tracks environmental health issues and diseases that **impact** our communities such as vector-borne diseases, radon, lead poisoning, lake algae, public health water violations, and air quality.




TRPHD distributed 100 free athome radon test kits in 2022. Radon is an undetectable radioactive gas that can cause lung cancer over time. Testing is the first step in reducing radon-induced lung cancer in the district!



Two Rivers Public Health Department participates in the Drug Overdoes Prevention Program through the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services Division of Public Health. This program strongly emphasizes on the collection of data, distribution of educational materials to both the public and medical providers, access to Naloxone, and connecting individuals with treatment options. Two Rivers has partnered with district bars to distribute naloxone and education on the signs of overdose, what to do during an overdose and where to get free Naloxone. Lockboxes have been distributed at district senior centers to encourage medication storage safety.


# PREPARING FOR THE FUTURE



## 2022-2023 Funding



### Increased public health funding can save lives.

According to the American Public Health Association (APHA), every 10% increase in funding for community-based public health programs has the potential to reduce deaths due to largely preventable causes by 1% to 7%. "Chronic conditions—the most common, costly, and preventable of all health problems—account for 90% of the nation's \$3.8 trillion in annual healthcare costs," the APHA reports.



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
