

Our District

- The district covers approximately 4663 square miles.
- The Republican River runs through the southern portion of the district, and the Platte River runs along the northern portion of the district.
- The total population of the district is approximately 97,284.
 - The majority of the population is near the I-80 corridor.
 - The largest urban areas are:
 - Holdrege (~5,439 people),
 - Lexington (~10,024 people), and
 - Kearney (~33,835 people).
 - This shows that about 51% of the population in the district live in three cities, while the remaining is rurally located.
- The central portion of the district is largely cropland.
- Both the northern and the southern portions of the district tend to be used as grazing land for cattle.

Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP) 1 Closeout Miscommunication

- Nebraska DHHS has been alerted by the U.S. Treasury that the reallocation of unused ERAP1 funding is no longer allowable through grant restrictions
- Allocation of these funds is allowable under the ERAP2 funding cycle, however, Nebraska will not be participating in this program






Public Health Relationship to Housing Instability

- Housing instability is intimately connected to health outcomes as well as income
- The connection of homelessness to poor health outcomes is well known, large studies from states in the Midwest suggest a close correlation between unstable housing situations and public health outcomes like:
 - infectious disease incidence risk,
 - long-term chronic disease management,
 - mental health
 - intimate partner violence






Safe Environment-Grant Connection

 - Pest Control





SERA Grant

- TRPHD Community Health Worker(s) will assist in navigation through the ERAP programs or find housing.
 TRPHD will also partner with local community groups to assist in finding housing.
- TRPHD Environmental Health Specialists will conduct assessments and facilitate service coordination. CHWs will provide advocacy and life skill development services and community resource linkage.
- TRPHD will provide funding assistance to *eligible citizens in order to complete lead abatement, radon mitigation, mold remediation, and pest control measures.
 - Eligible citizens are defined as individuals with disabilities, senior citizens, and low-income households with an income which does not exceed 80% of the median income for the district.





What now?

- TRPHD will continue to grow an environmental health program utilizing limited ARPA Funding
- Continue the following programs:
 - West Nile Virus mosquito trapping, disease investigation, and lab monitoring
 - Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention investigation and environmental assessment
 - Radon testing kits
 - Free in January
 - \$10 per kit February-December
